Mary Anne and Chuck Convis Pass Away



Mary Anne Convis passed away peacefully on November 24, 2021 in Grass Valley, Calif. at age 92. Six weeks later her husband Chuck Convis passed away on January 7, 2022, at age 95.

She was born on August 30, 1929 in Haynesville, La., to John Earl Crawley and Lottie Robison Crawley, and grew up in the East Texas oilfields in a loving family including older brother James Crawley (now of Norman, Okla.) and younger sister Charlotte Thomas (now of Houston, Tex.). She graduated from the University of Texas in Austin with a degree in Early Childhood Education. Throughout her life she championed education, particularly for women.

Mary Anne married Charles L. (Chuck) Convis in 1949. They had six children, and their love of new experiences and adventures led them to raising their children in places as diverse as Cambridge, Mass.; San Diego, San Rafael, and Redding, Calif.; San Marcos, Tex.; and Pittsburgh, Penn.

They retired to Carson City, Nev. in 1995, where Mary Anne served as chair of the Nevada Women's History Project and co-chair of the Sarah Winnemucca Statue Committee. She was the NWHP Woman of Achievement in 2004. She was an award-winning watercolorist, gifted seamstress, and lifelong reader who encouraged everyone around her to tell their stories through art and writing. Throughout her life she was involved in church activities, from serving as a church deacon and elder, to decorating the church altar.

In a bio written in 2014 Mary Anne said, "You can do anything you want to do if you want to do it bad enough. You may need to ask for help, but you can do it if you dream it." She lived this every day of her life and was particularly proud of teaching herself electrical wiring to build and wire the family vacation home in the mountains.

Mary Anne's family and loved ones remember her warmth, creativity, determined independence, and great luck on the Carson City slot machines. (Winnings included a car.) Her fierce dedication to women's causes, intellectual curiosity, and love of travel live on in her children, grandchildren, and the many friends and community members whose lives she touched. We mourn the loss of a true pioneer in Mary Anne Convis.

At the time of her death, Mary Anne was survived by a large and loving family: her husband of 72 years, Chuck Convis; children and in-laws Charles Convis, Jr. (Betsy), Margaret Convis Kadoyama (Bob), Jim Convis (Joy), Bill Convis (Sally), and David Convis (Christina); and 16 grandchildren, as well as a close circle of lifelong friends.

She was preceded in death by her firstborn child, Johnny (1951-1957).

MARIAN ALICE WRIGHT McCLELLAN

First woman Pershing County Commissioner promoted mining, roads, sewer and water systems

A place in history was secured when Marian Alice Wright McClellan, 78, the first woman elected as a Pershing County Commissioner, died Saturday September 7, 2019, at Renown Medical Center in Reno, Nev.

McClellan and her husband were owners of several small businesses, mining ventures and claims, a mobile home park and an assay laboratory in Upper Valley, near Lovelock, Nev.

Marian was born March 31, 1941, in Cripple Creek, Colorado, to Alice and F.M. Wright. She grew up in Colorado, Arizona and Utah with her two brothers, Dan and Dale Wright. She graduated from high school in Moab, Utah.

She married J.W. McClellan on November 3. 1967 in Coleman County, Texas. Prior to coming to Lovelock, he was a U.S. Air Force pilot stationed near Frankfurt, Germany. family moved to Pershing County 1972. Marian's father owned F.M. Wright Mining Company and the couple and her brothers joined her parents in the business. She took a class at the University of Nevada, Reno on assaying to ensure miners would have good assays on their ore. She was an assayer for around 20 years.

In 1978 she became chairman of the Pershing Concerned Citizens (PCC). The group was organized by ranchers, miners and small business owners to protect their rights against the U.S. government's encroachment with

wilderness designations by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and other government entities.

She testified at the Nevada Legislature hearings on BLM wilderness proposals and the need to keep Nevada lands open to all citizens. Only one area in Pershing County was designated as wilderness at that time. She held the chairmanship for more than 10 years.

Pershing County faced several economic changes in the early 1980s and 1990s. Following the Interstate 80 bypass of Lovelock, its county seat, in 1982, economic development and government projects slowed down. Her service to the county was instrumental in keeping local businesses viable and strong.

McClellan was an activist in the "Sagebrush Rebellion" as she worked with members of the Nevada Miners and Prospectors, a group of small independent miners, to improve mining economic conditions. Later she was appointed as a member of Nevada Legislative Committee on Public Lands from 1985-1992.

Elected to the Pershing County Board of County Commissioners in November 1984, she began working with Commissioners Robert Maher, Frank Rutherford and Roger Mancebo in January 1985 to improve economic conditions throughout the county.

As commissioner representative on the Pershing County Roads Department, she sought improvement on the roads in Grass Valley, Imlay, Cosgrave, Mill City as well as in Upper Valley and Lower Valley.

Serving as the commissioner and county representative to the Imlay sewer and water systems board, McClellan and the board sought grant funding for a complete new sewer and water system. The project was mandated because of the health risks to the towns' residents who were pouring bleach down the lines to disinfect the pipes. Other facilities like the fire departments in Imlay and Grass Valley were also updated.

She also represented the county on the Economic Development Authority which included the Tourism Board and the Community Center Board. The authority was able to convince state officials to build the Lovelock state prison (Lovelock Correctional Center facility), northeast of Lovelock. In 2019, McClellan supported the prison system plan to build a minimum-security camp in Pershing County.

The tourism board also sought to bring conventions to the county's fairly new building. The Nevada Association of County Commissioners agreed to hold their annual meeting there after an invitation from the local board. While commissioner, she also served as a vice president of NACCO in 1992. Marian was a member of Soroptimist International of Lovelock for several years.

Marian McClellan is buried in Lovelock's Big Meadow Cemetery.

Nevada Women: Lives well lived-We remember their contributions

As 2021 ends, we learn of the passing of NWHP founding member, Mary Anne Convis. July saw the passing of founding member, Fritisi Ericson. NWHP was fortunate to obtain the oral histories of both ladies which prompted us to ask the question: How many other outstanding women that we have interviewed since 2014 have died?

In NWHP partnered with the Women of Diversity Productions, Inc. in conducting over 80 interviews for their 2014 Sesquicentennial project. This inspired NWHP to think about making our own oral history website and we obtained an initial grant of \$10,000 from the John Ben Snow Memorial Trust in 2014. Thus, our webpage, Nevada Women - Gold in the Silver State was born. We have been fortunate to obtain subsequent grants to continue our oral interview project. Cumulatively we have interviewed 146 women in 13 counties since 2014 - from Reno in Washoe County to the town of Baker in White Pine County. The women listed below have passed away. 
New program addition:

This Guide was published as part of the Nevada Women's Archives **Project** established in 1992 at **UNR Special Collections** Jean Ford. purpose of the Women's Archives effort was to "collect, preserve. and provide catalog, accessibility to papers and records of Nevada women women's organizations.

As part of the NWHP goal to remain relevant with technology changes we began going to libraries, archives, and museums again to create an online Guide with links to video and database sites.

That resource has been on our nevadawomen.org website for several years with the name "Interviews-Alpha List." However, we didn't want to lose the connection to the original work and subsequent publication. We requested and received permission from UNR Special Collections to scan and post the 1998 publication.

original The link has been renamed Repositories of Nevada Women's History and provides both resources. There is a link to download the entire 1998 The Guide. spreadsheet with the new material follows an explanation of its creation and navigation of the information. Links within the spreadsheet are live and will take you to more information or to the actual item. Please keep in mind that links change at the materials source. We will try to keep these current.

As the introduction to the site states, there are currently over 11,000 entries in the spreadsheet. The suffrage centennial commemoration took much time and the repository spreadsheet hasn't been updated since 2019, but it will be updated during 2022 with several hundred new entries.
